	The original application is filed by the applicant	
	under Section 19 of the Administrative Tribunals Act,	
	1985, praying for direction upon the Respondents to give	
	appointment to the applicant on compassionate ground.	
	The contention of the applicant is that one	
	Balaram Murmu, the father of the applicant died on	
	May 3, 2009 while he was working as Constable under	
	Superintendent of Police, Paschim Medinipur. The	
	applicant submitted application for compassionate	
	appointment on the ground of death of his father while	
	he was in service. The applicant approached the Tribunal	
	by filing OA-844 of 2015 for non-consideration of his	
	application for appointment on compassionate ground.	
	On September 7, 2015, the Tribunal disposed of OA-844	
	of 2015 by directing the respondents of the said	
	application to take a decision in connection with the case	
	of the applicant for compassionate appointment within a	

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	period of 6 weeks from the date of communication of the	
	order. The grievance of the applicant is that the	
	respondents have not yet taken any decision in	
	connection with the case of the applicant for	
	compassionate appointment. On September 21, 2017,	
	the applicant submitted one representation through his	
	Learned Advocate before the Respondent No. 3 & 4 and	
	thereafter, approached the Tribunal by filing the present	
	original application on November 14, 2017.	
	Learned Counsel for the applicant submits that the	
	case of the applicant has not been considered by the	
	respondents as directed by the Tribunal by order dated	
	September 7, 2015 passed in OA-844 of 2015. On the	
	other hand, Learned Counsel representing the State	
	Respondents has produced copy of correspondence	
	between the Respondent No. 3 and the applicant and	
	copy of correspondences made between the respondents	
	themselves in connection with the compassionate	
	appointment of the applicant. Let the copy of the	
	correspondences be kept on record. The copy of the	
	correspondence dated February 3, 2016 indicates that the	
	Respondent No. 3 has communicated to the applicant by	
	enclosing a copy of the letter issued by the Respondent	

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	No. 4 on January 14, 2016 that the case of the applicant cannot be considered for compassionate appointment as the applicant did not attain majority within a period of 6 months from the date of death of his father. Moreover, the applicant has approached the Tribunal without waiting for 6 months from the date of last representation submitted on September 21, 2017 and as such, the present application is found to be premature.		
	In view of our above findings, we cannot persuade ourselves to intervene for giving any direction on the respondents as prayed by the applicant. The original application is, thus, dismissed.
